Hitting the High Notes:

Niamh O'Sullivan — Rising Star of the Opera World

Interviewing young Cork woman, and mezzo soprano, Niamh O'Sullivan, is a joy! You encounter someone who genuinely loves people and is passionate about her music and the challenging career she has chosen.

Family and School

"There was music in my family on both sides" says Niamh. Dad, Paul, used to sing around the house. Mother, Regina, a primary school principal, supported Niamh's talent so much. Both parents were always encouraging.

"I have happy memories of singing in Church choirs at Christmas. I also sang a solo piece at my Confirmation ceremony. Mum and granny both recall that as a special moment. My family have always been so encouraging and supportive, including my sister, Nicola". It was in school at Regina Mundi, that Niamh's great gift was further nurtured and developed. "I loved singing with the Regina Mundi Choir". Niamh pays special tribute to her music teacher and friend, Rose Beecher.

A "bewitchingly beautiful, dark vibrant voice"

Niamh has been praised for her "bewitchingly beautiful, dark vibrant voice" (Süddeutsche Zeitung). She studied at the Royal Irish Academy of Music in Dublin under the late and legendary Veronica Dunne, a great mentor and an icon of the Irish music world. She followed her studies by joining the Opera Studio at the Bayerische Staatsoper, Munich, in 2016.


"Arriving in Munich as a young twenty-one-year-old, was a major challenge" says Niamh, "I had to learn a lot very quickly, including coming up to speed in several languages. But I love this world, the people, the music, the excitement and the spontaneity. You never know what's coming next".

Roles To Date

Niamh's numerous operatic engagements in Munich include Hänsel in Humperdinck's Hänsel und Gretel, Kate Pinkerton in Madama Butterfly, the Secretary in Menotti's The Consul, Flora in La Traviata and Barena in Jenůfa. She also travelled with the company of the Bayerische Staatsoper for a concert performance of Der Rosenkavalier at Carnegie Hall, New York, conducted by Kirill Petrenko. Other appearances include her 2018 Irish National Opera debut as Tisbe La Cenerentola, Third Maid Elektra with INO and in Cousser's The Applause of Mount Parnassus at the Wigmore Hall with Ensemble Marsyas, under the musical direction of Peter Whelan.







Highlights

Niamh lists the concert performance of Der Rosenkavalier at Carnegie Hall as one of the highlights of her career to date. "I also sang the role of Flora in La Traviata, alongside the great Placido Domingo, in Munich in 2019. It was an amazing experience".

And in concert...

In concert, Niamh has performed Elgar's Sea Pictures at the Prinzregententheater as part of the Munich Festspiele in July 2019 and sang both Mozart's Requiem and Handel's Messiah with the Müncher Hofkantorei. She also performed the main role of 'Cain' in Scarlatti's Oratorio II Primo Omicidio with The Jakobsplatz Orchester conducted by Daniel Grossmann.

Favourite Singers

Asked about her some of her own favourite singers, Niamh mentions the Latvian soprano, Elina Garanca and Ermonela Jaho from Albania. "Among the men, of course, Jonas Kaufmann, whom I know here in Munich. Jonas is one of opera's greatest ever tenors. The range and versatility of his voice are just stunning. And he is such a lovely person to meet".

Looking Ahead

In the 2021-22 season, Niamh will make her Zurich Opera debut as Wellgunde in Das Rheingold, returning later in the season for Meg Page in Falstaff. She also makes numerous appearances with Irish National Opera including Alva in the World Premiere of The First Child; Asteria Bajazet at both the Linbury Theatre, Royal Opera House, and across Ireland on tour as Mercédès in Carmen. She made her Wexford Festival Opera debut as Paulina in Ein Wintermarchen, in October, also appearing at the festival in recital and gala concert.

Follow Your Dream!

Niamh is encouraging of young people who dream of a career in the music world. "It's really hard work, of course. You need a certain mental toughness. My advice is go and see everything, listen to everyone and learn from the greats. You also need to get comfortable in several languages. But it is such an amazing and rewarding life".

Gratitude

Asked about future plans. Niamh mentions auditioning for several major roles. "I am so grateful to my family, my friends and all the people at home for their support. I have been given this gift and I look forward to continuing to develop it in the years ahead. In the challenging times in which we live, the gift of music can so enrich people's lives". Niamh dreams of future debuts in Vienna, Paris and many of the world's major opera houses. Surely, not far away, in the coming years!



Our young cancer patients are considered within the critically vulnerable group as their treatment, including chemotherapy, causes immunosuppression. The POONS service will help these patients to stay at home and keep them safe in the months ahead."


The Swim Re-Imagined!

The Swim has been running now for the last 9 years. It was started by his school friends to remember Danny, who passed away after a long battle with leukaemia, in 2013. To date the swim has raised over €130,000 for the Mercy Kids & Teens Appeal. Traditionally the Swim was always held at Myrtleville Beach, but due to COVID restrictions, swimmers were asked to swim wherever they safely could, and upload videos of their swim online in 2020. The 2021 Swim provides both options this year. For your safety, the choice is yours!

MEET PROFESSOR OF EMERGENCY MEDICINE AND COLÁISTE CHRÍOST RÍ PAST PUPIL CONOR DEASY

Conor is Professor of Emergency Medicine and Clinical Director of Unscheduled Care at Cork University Hospital (CUH) and University College Cork. He is an Associate Adjunct Professor at the School of Primary Care, Monash University, Australia.

Having studied medicine at University College Cork, Conor completed his specialist training in Emergency Medicine in Ireland before moving to Australia where he worked as a Consultant in Emergency Medicine at the Alfred Emergency and Trauma Centre, Melbourne. While there he completed a PhD at the Department of Epidemiology and Preventive Medicine, Monash University in collaboration with Ambulance Victoria. To date Conor has published across the domains of patient safety, quality of care, systems of care, procedural sedation, trauma care as well as out of hospital cardiac arrest.

Conor Deasy entered Coláiste Chríost Rí in 1988. He attributes his initial interest in Science and Biology to legendary teacher, the late Jim Cremin (RIP). "Jim was an amazing educator and a huge influence", says Conor. "To this day I use the explanatory diagrams taught by Jim in explaining medical conditions to my patients".

In 1990 Conor's Dad was diagnosed with head and neck cancer and died in 1991. "I am so grateful for the pastoral care provided to me by the staff in Chríost Rí" Conor mentions the late Tom O'Keefe (RIP).

A few years ago in a Coláiste Chríost Rí publication, Conor (while working in Australia) reflected on how the caring Christian ethos of Coláiste Críost Rí is an inspiration to his work as an emergency physician:

'In my daily work as an Emergency Phy in Críost Rí. When the chips are down, the resuscitation room patient fights for their life, the waiting room heaves with palpable and understandable impatience. The the Críost Rí hard work ethic comes to the fore. When aking bad news to patients or their famil that empathetic eye that once looked into mine becomes focussed in my consciousness. When tensions are high, as they often are in the work I do, the Críost Rí sense of humour is th release valve that keeps all sane. So tonight, as I cycle along the banks of Melbourne's Yarra River,I look forward to a time when I can bring the skills, attitud and behaviours acquired over the years to the city by the Lee to serve the people with whom my heart lies. This will be my thank you to the Críost Ri community who harnessed the passion of a young boy.

We are so glad you are back among us, Conor! All in the CCR Community and the Presentation Family are so proud of you and wish continued blessings on the work you do!



Danny Peilow's Transplant Journey

A Second Chance at Life

"It feels like I've been given a second chance at a life. I'm so grateful to my family and friends and so many medical people. I now intend to live life to the full".

As Danny Peilow reflects now on his journey, this side of successful kidney transplant surgery, it's a long way from a dark day in September 2020, in C.U.H., when he was diagnosed with kidney failure. His only chance of survival was a kidney transplant.

"It hit me like a tonne of bricks" says Danny and turned my life upside down".

Life-Changing Diagnosis

Danny, a past pupil of PBC Cork and a graduate of UCC, was working in Laya Health Care at the time. He was loving his first job and enjoying an active life. "I was always into sport. I had rowed in school and loved swimming. I had a kidney issue since childhood but had no idea it would take this turn".

Danny's diagnosis would have an equally life-changing effect on his family — parents, Eileen and Pat, his brother Tom, and Tom's girlfriend, Louise.

"They were all brilliant. I couldn't have got through it without them" says Danny.

A Difficult Journey

Danny's mother, Eileen, looking back, can now reflect on a very traumatic time. The emotion is still raw. "From Danny's diagnosis in September 2020 to the date of his surgery 23 August 2021 was the

most difficult time of our lives" says Eileen "We had the paradox of another wise healthy young man, who was at death's door. It was a hard time. But people were amazing — our family, Danny and Tom's friends, the wider community. We had so many people praying for us. We really appreciated all the support".

Courage, Character and Humour

Eileen feels that it was Danny's personality — his great character, courage and sense of humour that brought him through. Coping with this experience would have been difficult at any time, but to do so during a time of Covid was so much harder. "Covid complicated an already difficult situation. The need for isolation, the routine of dialysis, visits to C.U.H. and to Dublin — this became Danny's life. It was not knowing when or how it would end that made it really stressful".

A Brother's Love

Danny's brother Tom was his kidney donor. "Once I was deemed suitable, there was no question but that I wanted to donate" says Tom "That's what brothers are for!" When Tom went to his physician, Ms. Little for his post op check-up, he said to her "You're a magician!". Ms. Little's reply was "No, Tom. You're the magic one. You are the hero. You have given the gift of life". How true! For Danny, Eileen and Pat, Tom and Louise, 23 August will always be a red-letter day in their lives.

Excellent Medical Care

"We are so grateful that the surgeries were so successful. Danny and Tom received excellent medical care at all stages of this journey. We have so many people to whom we are truly grateful" says Eileen. As well as family and amazing friends, Eileen mentions supportive



employers, then the wonderful Mr. Liam Plant and the nurses in the Renal Ward in C.U.H., especially Phil, Rachel, Mary and May. In Beaumont Hospital, Dublin, the Transplant Co-ordinator and the Staff in St. Damien's Renal Ward were brilliant. Tom's surgeon, Ms. Dilly Little and Danny's surgeon, Mr. Ian Robertson, were outstanding.

Looking to the Future

"My life was on hold for over a year" says Danny "but now I am looking to the future with new hope. My doctors are telling me to go and live a normal life. I intend to live life to the full. It's probably the best way I can repay all those who supported me" says Danny "I hope my journey will encourage other people waiting for transplants. There will be dark days, but you can always get through with the help of family and friends".

We thank God for this good news story. Congratulations to a wonderful family and to two young men of courage!

Thanks to the Peilow Family for sharing their story. We wish Danny and Tom health, happiness and every blessing in the years ahead. The Peilows are very much part of the Presentation Family. Letter to a New Leader

Brother Dominic Sassi CFC

Life has changed so much since I first took on a leadership role, not least in the educational world. However, some things remain the same. Leadership is about people and your ability to inspire them, encourage them and motivate them. I have spent forty years in one leadership role or another, in education and in my religious Congregation. I will share with you some learnings from that experience and respectfully offer some advice for new and incoming leaders.



The Call to Leadership

I consider a leader, not simply to be doing a job, but to be living out a vocation. I say that, not because I am a Religious Brother, but because any leader worthy of the name is called to focus on serving the common good and so contributes both to the material as well as the spiritual well-being of society and of those she serves.

First, the task of leadership today needs a thoroughly professional approach. Training, in-service and ongoing formation are critical. As leaders tasked with detailed planning, we must help those with whom we serve to understand and buy into why we do what we do. Regular, on-going and clear communication from the leader is critical.

It is also important to try and remain faithful to the principles of good leadership, namely integrity, selflessness, openness, accountability and inclusion of all those you serve. Some of the practices that I have found helpful include:

- · Observing and noticing the activities all around the school
- Listening and learning from students, teachers, staff and parents
- Interacting and collaborating with members of the staff.
- When I was a school principal, I liked to get out of my office and move around the school. This helped me to get to know all the students. These practices apply to other forms of leadership as well. Don't stay stuck at your desk living a virtual life. Get to know your people and spend time with them.
- I believe the good leader must be a relational leader, a peoples' person. She should aim for a healthy professional relationship based on cooperation and collaboration, mutual respect, and sensitivity towards others, and open communication.

Servant Leadership — the Christian Way

What exactly is servant leadership? We see servant leadership in the life and work of Jesus who said: "The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve." The night before he died, Jesus gave an amazing example of servant leadership when he washed his disciples' feet and urged them, "I have given you an example so that you may copy what I have done to you; now you should wash each other's feet." His very life was lived for others.

Edmund Rice as Leader

We see the same in the life of Blessed Edmund Rice. Like Jesus, he also gave everything he had for the welfare of others. The story of the rich young man in Matthew's gospel is turned upside down in the life of Edmund Rice because what the rich young man found impossible to do, Edmund did in a precise and literal way. He did sell what he had, gave it to the poor and then followed Christ in the manner that appeared to him to be most spiritually productive and materially practical. He sold his thriving business and devoted the proceeds to the most deprived of God's children. And having exchanged his comfortable home for a bleak room in a stable loft, he devoted himself as well. Edmund Rice was passionate for mission. He gathered a community around him to pursue that mission. How does this mission challenge us today?

LEADERSHIP

Do not be afraid!

I say to any prospective leader — do not be afraid! Your resources are more than you could have ever imagined. You belong to a world-wide network which, by working together, will allow you to achieve amazing results. Seek the advice of colleagues and other leaders. Surround yourself with a number of highly talented people who will both support you and give you critical feedback.

One of the things I enjoyed when I was engaged in Congregational leadership was to visit Brothers' communities and schools in different parts of the world and see the marvellous work, they and the Edmund Rice Network were doing in the name of Jesus and Edmund. And you share that same spirit. Constantly seek to learn from the good practice of those who are doing the mission well.

'Your life is the greatest enterprise in the world' Pope Francis

Pope Francis spoke these words at the beginning of 2018: "You can have flaws, and be anxious, and even be angry, but do not forget that your life is the greatest enterprise in the world. Only you can stop it from going bust. Many appreciate you, admire you and love you.

Remember that to be happy is not to have a sky without a storm, a road without accidents, work without fatigue, relationships without disappointments. To be happy is to find strength in forgiveness, hope in battles, security in the face of fear, love in discord. It is not only to enjoy the smile, but also to reflect on the sadness. It is not only to celebrate the successes, but to learn lessons from the failures... Use your losses to train patience. Use your mistakes to sculpture serenity. Use pain to plaster pleasure. Use obstacles to open windows of intelligence. Never give up Never give up on people who love you. Never give up on happiness, for life is an incredible show."

Your challenge is to inspire others through your leadership. It is a great privilege to be called to lead. Enjoy the journey. I wish you well!

Teacher, Seán Ó Loinsigh pays tribute on behalf of the School Community.

It is a great honour, on behalf of the school community of Scoil Iosaef Naofa, Cobh, to pay tribute to our esteemed and much loved colleague and leader, Tony, on the occasion of his recent retirement.

Presentation Tradition

As a young man, Anthony was steeped in the ethos of the Presentation Brothers tradition. His family has contributed massively to education in the Presentation Community. Having graduated from U.C.C. and St. Patrick's College of Education, Anthony joined the staff of Scoil Iosaef Naofa in 1982. His brother, Br. Martin was already teaching there.

'The Brothers'

Our school, back then, was very much known as 'The Brothers'. The Principal was Br. Stephen, a man hugely respected, especially for his love of sport and mentoring of young people. He was succeeded by the highly esteemed, Br. Benildus, who was the last Brother Principal. Our school then entered a new era in 1992, as Michael Farrell and then Anthony Kenneally led our school for the following 29 years. Scoil losaef continued to be referred to as 'The Brothers'. Certainly, both Mike and Tony ensured that we remained a school in the Presentation and Edmund Rice tradition.

Presentation Ethos

Many occasions were marked in those years to maintain the connection, especially through the celebration of Presentation Day, and engaging the students in projects on the life of Edmund Rice. We proudly competed in hurling in the Edmund Rice blitz, and in gaelic football in the Cork/Kerry Colm Cooper Cup in Killarney. On a personal note, I have a great memory of the year Tony devoted the day to travel with me to Presentation Monastery School, Killarney, for that competition. I think got a strong impression of the sense of collegiality among our Presentation school colleagues.

Maintaining the Link

At this point, I reflect on the departure of Anthony Kenneally from Scoil losaef. With him departs an enormous connection with the Presentation Order. All of us here wish to maintain the link, but the onus is on us to work at it. I am pleased that our present logo and signage includes a reference to 'A Catholic School in the Presentation Tradition'.

A Skilled Educator

Anthony taught in our school as a skilled educator for almost 4 decades, mostly in the senior classes. In his last years as a classroom teacher, he moved to teach in a junior class. This was a bold move on his part, though it proved a great, wise and beneficial thing to do, in preparation for his time as school leader.

Extraordinary Leader

In Anthony's decade as principal, he displayed extraordinary leadership. He led the establishment of 'An Droichead', our additional needs unit. He displayed outstanding guidance to his colleagues in many difficult situations. He provided support to staff in times of crisis, above and

beyond what might be expected of a principal. He was an exemplary leader.

Anthony also provided advice for colleagues consistently on matters of teaching, planning, evaluating and communicating with parents/guardians. His advice was invariably spot on. He was wise and skilful in the recruitment of staff.

Handing on the Baton

Tony retires just after Marty Fleming, Willie McSweeney, Maureen O'Connell and a short while after a number of other staff members. It marks a major time of change on our staff. The onus is now on us, the current staff, to ensure that our school continues to be 'A Catholic school in the Presentation Tradition'.

Celebration

At the end of June, in line with Covid guidelines, we held an outdoor celebration to mark Tony's retirement. It was a very enjoyable occasion, though wholly inadequate as a means of marking such a long and distinguished career. We have yet to give him the type of 'send-off' he so richly deserves.

On behalf of our school community, I wish Tony health and happiness in retirement. I thank him for his friendship and hope that he remains in ongoing contact with us.







What is your philosophy of leadership?

Any tips you would give to young leaders?

Don't be afraid to put your hand up and volunteer to lead something. Usually there are more opportunities to lead than there are people who are willing to give it a go.

Everyone has insecurities and feels like an imposter from time-to-time. It goes with the territory. If you feel like this just talk to someone else in a leadership position and you will see how common it is - knowing others feel like this too does help!

There are so many things to learn about leadership so do not be afraid to dive in. There are different styles and approaches and techniques. There is no one right way to do things.

What is the idea of a university for today?

For me it is simply this: a university is there to make a positive difference in the world. I do believe in the transformative powers of education.

I also believe that an independent university that fosters critical thinking is part of the democratic fabric of a nation.

What are your hopes for the future of Trinity?

In my election campaign earlier this year I spoke about the values I want to see lived every day by our staff and students. I want to make Trinity a climate-first university with sustainability and biodiversity at the heart of our operations.

I also want Trinity to be an exceptional place to learn and a creative place to work. And I want to embed a deep-rooted fairness where equality, diversity and inclusion are ingrained in how we behave.

What are the biggest challenges you face?

The COVID-19 pandemic is the most serious challenge at the moment. Trying to strike a balance between protecting our students & staff, and offering an in-person college experience is not easy.

On top of that, there are other challenges such as the low funding given to universities in Ireland. We really need well-funded, dynamic universities. The pandemic has shown how vital it is for our society to have excellent researchers and experts on a whole range of topics. That is one of the great things that Trinity – and the other universities – offer Irish society today. With more funding we could provide more resources for our teaching too and give students an even better experience.

MEET THE BROTHERS: **BR. FRANCIS AGOAH** Congregation Leader, Presentation Brothers

Tell us a little bit about your background

I was born in Bolgatanga, the regional capital of Upper East Region in the northeastern part of Ghana. I was not born Catholic but due to the inspiration I got from my village Catechist who used to come to teach religion in our school, I started going to church at an early age. Apart from my father who remained a traditional believer until his death in 2002, the rest of my family converted to Catholicism.

In 1975, I gained admission into Notre Dame Secondary School where I met the Presentation Brothers for the first time. It was here the seed of my vocation was sown. The Brothers were totally dedicated to the growth of the young students under their care. They went beyond the call of duty to help and support the less academically and materially endowed students. In 1983, I joined the Presentation Brothers.

How do you see the mission of the Presentation Brothers today?

The mission of the Presentation Brothers continues to be relevant and necessary in today's world as we strive to adapt our ministries to meet needs and signs of the times. For example, in Ireland, we have found a new way of reaching out to young adults and other groups through the L.E.A.F Project. It is a wonderful example of how we are called to witness in new ways. Our recent initiatives of inviting young men from Haiti and Sri Lanka to join our Congregation is beginning to bear fruit. We have four men who have begun their studies with us in Grenada in the West Indies and three young Brothers from Sri Lanka.

What are your hopes for the future of Ghana?

Ghana is a country with a rich historical significance, being the first 'black' African country to gain independence from Britain in 1957. Even though the country started well after independence under our first President, Kwame Nkrumah, it has, over the years suffered many political and economic upheavals. This has affected its growth and development. However, things have improved over the past twenty years after genuine democracy took hold.

My hopes for the future of young people in my beloved Ghana are the following: that more job opportunities will be available to the many young men and women who emerge from our education system without hope of getting a decent job; that there would be less corruption in our body politic; that young people will be encouraged and empowered to make a positive contribution towards the future growth and prosperity of Ghana.

From Karachi to Waterford Br. Kevin's Mission Among Asylum Seekers and Refugees

Growing up in Pakistan, Br. Kevin Mascarenhas never dreamt he would spend fourteen years in Waterford working among asylum seekers and refugees.

"God has a sense of humour" says Br. Kevin, "I hardly knew where Waterford was, when I joined the Presentation Brothers in Canada, but that's where I ended up! A small group of us founded the Integration and Support Unit in Mount Sion, Waterford, and worked with over 5000 asylum seekers and refugees. I am also one of the founding members of the Place of Sanctuary Ireland Movement and the Cork City of Sanctuary Initiative. It's work I am passionate about".

Places of Sanctuary Ireland is a network of groups in cities, towns and local communities whose primary aim is to create a culture of welcome and safety for refugees, asylum-seekers and other immigrants, many of whom are seeking sanctuary from war and persecution. It creates opportunities for Irish people to meet these newcomers to our country, to hear their stories and to help them find a new home here among us.

Cork - A City of Sanctuary

Cork City of Sanctuary Movement is a member of the Places of Sanctuary Ireland and is in the process of securing recognition of Cork City as a Place of Sanctuary, inclusion and openness to migrants and people of migrant origin.

City of Sanctuary is also involved in Schools of Sanctuary, Universities of Sanctuary and Churches of Sanctuary.


What is a School of Sanctuary?

A School of Sanctuary is a school that works on providing a sense of safety for those whose lives may be in danger in their own country, who have troubles at home or are just looking for a space where they can feel safe. The whole school is committed to making it a safe and welcoming place for anyone seeking sanctuary.

Churches of Sanctuary

The concepts of Sanctuary and Hospitality are prominent in many different faiths and are central to Christianity.

When a faith community receives the Place of Sanctuary designation, it is an affirmation that the community is one in which hospitality and sanctuary are



woven into their life and explicitly stated, so that those looking for a welcome will know that they will find one there.

Africa and Europe Faith and Justice Network

Br. Kevin is also part of the Africa and Europe Faith and Justice network; an international network of religious congregations and missionaries working to challenge and change structural injustice and inequality that impacts on the most vulnerable.

"I believe this work is close to the heart of Edmund Rice" says Br. Kevin, "I receive great support from the Brothers and the Presentation Family. I think, together, we can make a difference. Hospitality is so much part of Irish culture and the 'new' Irish can enrich our society in so many ways".



DOES TRUE JUSTICE CALL FOR PUNISHMENT OR FOR HEALING?

Presentation Sister and Prison Chaplain publishes book - 'Unheard Voices'

For the Christian, to look on the other as God intended is to acknowledge their inherent humanity, with all its strengths as well as its vulnerabilities. Once we accept this holistic perspective, we are bound to apply it, including in our response to and reatment of the perpetrators of crime.

In a new book, Unheard Voices: Reflections of a Prison Chaplain, author, Presentation Sister Imelda Wickham throws down the gauntlet and challenges us to listen to the voices of the incarcerated. She gives us a brief human insight into life behind bars in our penal institutions. She also gives voice to those so often unheard through her reflections on the stories of prisoners about the reality of life within a prison cell.

Sr. Imelda also draws our attention to the injustice abounding in our society where incarceration is deployed rather than hospitalisation for those suffering from addiction and mental health problems. She questions the use of prisons to deal with addictions, mental health issues and homelessness.

She challenges us to both literally and metaphorically 'pull down the walls' in the design of our societal punishment system: calling for a restorative justice system, with support and rehabilitation built into the penalty, Wickham argues that true justice lies in healing for all involved in criminal behaviour, including victim, perpetrator and society.

Imelda Wickham PBVM was a Prison Chaplain for twenty years and held the role of National Coordinator of Prison Chaplains for three years. She is a founding member of T.R.A.I.L (Transitional Residential Accommodation for Independent Living) — a project designed to help homeless people leaving prison. She is currently involved in establishing a support service for the families of people in prison called New Directions —Supporting Families of People in Prison.

The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary – 21 November

Homily - Denis McBride C.Ss.R.



Dear Friends: The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary is not recounted in any of the four Gospels, but it is in The Protoevangelium of James, also known as the Infancy Gospel of James. This is an apocryphal Gospel written towards the end of the second century. In the first section of the text, we are introduced to Joachim and Anna, the parents of Mary. As yet they have no child. One day an angel stands before Anna and calls her by name. The angel tells her that the Lord has heard her prayer and that soon she will conceive and that the whole world will know about her child.

Anna promises to give the child as a gift to the Lord, whether it is male or female. Her child will minister to the Lord all the days of its life. What faith cannot answer, a sympathetic imagination is ready to supply, which has made this writing very popular for painting and icons, particularly in the Orthodox traditions.

You can see the story in the imaginative painting by Vittore Carpaccio. Born in Venice Carpaccio sets the story in the luscious background of a Venetian piazza. You see Mary, leaving her parents and relatives behind her, as she kneels on one of the steps that rise to the Temple entrance. She faces away from her family towards her new home. At the bottom of the steps, you can see Joachim and Anna with the other members of the family watch as Mary leaves them behind to enter the Temple. She kneels before the high priest who has come to welcome her. All her family have to let her go. In the bottom right-hand corner, a small boy holds his pet doe, a symbol of innocence, but is distracted and misses this great moment.

The feast followed the dedication of the Basilica of Saint Mary, built in 543 by the Byzantines. The Eastern Church took the feast to its heart, but it does appear in the West in the 11th century. In the 16th century it became a feast of the universal Church, celebrated on 21st November. Even though the feast has no basis in history, it stresses an important truth about Mary: that from the beginning of her life, she was wholly dedicated to God.

Of course, later on, Mary will become a greater temple than any constructed by hands. Let us now look at the great painting by Caravaggio, The Madonna of the Pilgrims.





Have a good look. It is beautiful, isn't it? In this painting we see Mary presenting Jesus to the little people, these two pilgrims, staff in hand, who have journeyed long and far in the hope of meeting the child Jesus.

They are not celebrities, magi or kings from the east, just ordinary folk. And their destination is not a temple, not a palace, not a shrine. Their destination is a person, the person of Jesus.

The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary — 21 November

Although like Mary Jesus was presented in the Temple, more importantly it is Mary who presents Jesus to those who seek him out. Mary is not clutching the child possessively to herself, saying through her body language: "He is mine, only mine."

No, she presents Jesus to those who seek him. She holds the child for others to see, for others to reach, for others to touch. Jesus is her own but not her own. He belongs to all who hunger for his presence.

Mary's vocation is not only to hold Jesus but also to let him go; let him become the person he must become; let him love the people he chooses to love and the friends he elects to call; let him choose the roads he must walk; let him follow the mysterious inner voice that speaks to him alone. All mothers must learn the painful act of letting go. Mothers must not only nurture the presence of the child within them; they must nurture the leaving of the child in time and let go.

Today we celebrate the Presentation of Mary; this feast challenges all of us to present Mary and Jesus not in a Temple building but in the hearts and minds of all of who live in a wounded world. We not only hold Mary and Jesus in our hearts, but because we love them, we share them. The people we love we should never keep possessively to ourselves.

Those we love should be presented to a wider world. That is today's lovely feast.
